

Annette Buckland, proud owner of two big Healey's

This story begins at the 'Shed' in the very early 1960's. The Shed was located behind Wright's Service Station in Warrigal Road just north of High Street in Ashwood. It was a rusty corrugated iron building my father leased for storing building equipment. There was enough floor space to house the latest car creation and yard space for young car lovers to visit and simply enjoy each others company. Ken Buckland would visit regularly as he lived within walking distance from his family home and in previous years ran the petrol pump driveway service on a Sunday for the Wrights in the 'good old days'. I became friends with Ken, he would join me at race meetings when I raced my Nalla Holden in the early 60's. His father Wesley had gifted his 48 series Holden to Ken in 1962 that began a passion for motor sport and later classic cars. I would arrive at Ken's home some evenings to help him improve the performance of his Holden and clearly remember lying across the front guard with the bonnet off circling the block while attempting to tune the twin stromberg carburetors. We had also fitted exhaust extractors, the car sounded like the real deal. We followed this with the usual diff oil to the lever shocks and ventilated the brakes and installed surge plates to the sump and rear diff housing. I had at times stayed over night at Ken's home, his father was interested in our efforts to improve the cars performance and would join us for a late night beer and insist that if you have a drink you do not drive, stay the night. I would chuckle to myself to find a bucket beside my bed! The A7 Club were to run a 7 hour relay race at Calder at that time, and as I also had a 48 series we decided to make up a team of three cars and compete in the 1965 seven hour relay event at Calder. With all our Holdens running well that day we managed a 3rd place outright, a very good result for us.

Ken had begun his working life with the State Bank as a 16 year old and was told at the time you will have a job for life with the Bank. I had by this time met Janet and married. We then headed to live in Canada, so our lives took different directions for a number of years. On

returning to Australia in early 1970 Ken had already developed a love of all things Austin Healey. He purchased a basket case Healey 3000 MKIII best known as the big Healey, built between 1959 and 1967. The cars body was made by Jenson Motors and the vehicles assembled at BMC's MG works in Abingdon. The 3 litre 3000 was a highly successful car winning its class in many European rallies. In 1963, 91.5 percent of all Austin Healey 3000 cars were exported, mostly to North America. My Brother took on the task of rebuilding Kens big Healey.

In 1974 Annette at this time was also working at the State Bank and Ken took Annette out for social weekends. Annette soon learnt their social outings were always heading to some motoring event held somewhere in Victoria. In any event it was a great introduction to Ken's passion and as is often the case one's interest in motor sport becomes a life long journey for those involved. Ken in 1976 moved to Blairgowrie and worked for the State Bank in Sorrento as the accountant. He and Annette married in 1979. Ken became the State Bank examiner that had him travelling far and wide across the state. He had the unfortunate role of winding up many of the branches with the State Bank's demise. He undertook work with the Commonwealth bank until his retirement.

When Janet and I came to live at Sorrento some 24 years ago I reconnected with Ken and his Healey interests visiting his home at Blairgowrie. His latest project was with a BN4 Healey that required restoration. His passion for big Healeys would be fulfilled by making this car into a replica Pat Moss rally Healey and in my opinion and Ken's, one of the best looking and rally ready of the entire Healey range of cars. Pat Moss was one of the most successful female auto rally drivers of all time. She was crowned European Ladies Rally Champion five times. [1959,1960, 1962, 1964/65] Her older Brother was Stirling Moss who taught her how to drive at 11 years of age. When Standard Triumph declined to fund her TR2 in 1955 the MG car group offered her cars and expenses thus benefiting the British Motor Corporation. In 1960 Moss took over-all victory at the Liege-Rome-Liege in an Austin Healey 3000 and went on to finish 2nd at the Coupe des Alpes and 2nd in the RAC Rally with the Austin Healey.

Ken went all out to produce this Pat Moss Rally replica Healey. I observed with interest the cars progress and my only contribution was to make the adjustable tracks for the rally seat installations. Ken would phone when the weather was suitable for a coffee run to Flinders in our classics which I always looked forward to. I would catch up with Ken at numerous motor sport events and car displays in his Moss Replica. Unbeknown to me, was that Ken had health issues and it came as a shock to me and many others of his passing, now some years ago.

I am very pleased to know that Annette is now the proud owner and custodian of the two big Healey's, the 3000 MK III and the Pat Moss Replica. All the years of attending motoring events has prepared Annette for the ownership and the pleasure that comes from the classic car scene. It is obvious to me that Annette has the interest and skills to drive and maintain the cars.







Annette, who volunteers at the Sorrento Citizen Centre and the Museum is not afraid to be involved, and looks forward to driving the Healey to future events. Annette drove to the Citizen Centre recently and parked the Moss car outside. She was met by those coming into the Centre with excited voices saying 'Have you seen the classic car outside? And who owns it?' Annette said 'I do', which was met with 'No you don't', 'Well I do!'. Annette intends to take the Moss Replica to the classic car motor show at Point Nepean in October and be part of the S.P.C.& H.C.C. group.



When meeting with Annette she was busy compiling the



history of Ken's cars with a photo album vast in its contents. I had known Ken for a long time and was surprised at the extent of his collection and the photo's recording the various stages of Healey restoration. I have suggested to Annette that fellow Healey owners in our club would be more than happy to provide any advice in relation to all aspects of the car. Annette would prefer a lighter clutch operation, in the meantime keep an eye out for this Healey and Annette's friendly wave.

The day was a little bit cool, but at least the sun did shine. We had 14 very shiny cars in total to display at the Village. They were lined up in 2 sections around the car park. Update on The Wolseley 1500.

Hi Bill.

An interesting article on the Wolseley and Riley versions of the series 1 Morris Major cars.

In Australia we did not have the Riley version but there were plenty of the Wolseley and Major versions made at Zetland in Sydney. I didn't realise it had the same wheelbase as the Morris Minor. Being somewhat more powerful than the Minor it was much more skittish.



I had a Series 2 Lancer (I don't think there was a Series 1 Lancer), in which I did 75,000 miles It was two tone like that you showed in the Crankhandle, except the blue on mine was darker and the wheels were cream. The longer wheel base made it a much better handling car.

I feel that some of your info regarding the engine was incorrect. The Rileys may have had 8.1:1 but the Wolseley and Morris had the 7.2:1 pistons. The Riley may nave been considered the "Sporty" version. Remember back in those days Australia was considered to have "poor quality" petrol and export Rover 3 litres like mine had

7.5:1 pistons, whereas Home and Europe cars had 8.75:1 pistons

The series 2 Majors and Lancer cars had 7.7:1 pistons, as I found out when I had to replace one. The replacement piston initially supplied had a different bowl size and while the parts guy rather quickly found the correct one the P/Ns were wrong. Some idiot had given the later 7.7:1 piston the part number of the old piston !!!!!!! Just as well that I saw the difference and didn't fit it.

There were no series 2 Wolseleys or Rileys made at Zetland and once the series 2 cars were here, BMC didn't import any Wolseleys or Rileys.

As you can see the bonnet on the Lancer didn't really conform to the mudguard and grille top. This was masked a bit by the grille top and was fixed properly when the Major Elite with the 1623cc engine was released.

Further Discussion of Oils and Filters Ken Burrows

After the presentation on Tuesday evening, I was talking to some members and the topic of Flushing Oils "was raised. I then realised that I had not commented on these during the presentation, a topic I had meant to talk about but had overlooked. Perhaps a short note could be included in a subsequent magazine.

I have come across this issue many times over the past 40 or so years and I am surprised that there are some folk who still believe in their use. They are potential engine destroyers for all the wrong reasons. I have head of people using the following fluids:-

- Oils that have very low viscosity in the belief that this will flush out the galleries.
- Diesolene because this will flush the galleries
- Kerosene for the same reason as in 1 and 2 above.

All these practices are more likely to cause a total engine failure than achieve any cleaning, apart from the subsequent cleaning to remove the debris from the bearing and crankshaft failure.

Unless the normal oil has been over due for a change or contaminated with coolant, the only deposit usually found is varnish deposited on the steel surfaces from the effects of temperature on the oil. This varnish will be only several microns thick and apart from being unsightly will have no deleterious effect on the subsequent oil used in the engine. Multigrade oils usually have a detergent component that will slowly remove old varnish in line with the "splash" that comes out from between the connecting rod ends and the crankshaft throws during operation.

The flushing oil folk run their concoctions for anything from an hour up to a day. Apart from the very low viscosity oils neither diesoline or kerosene have any real lubricating or load bearing properties and really can't support engine operation even at idle.

As I said, originally lubricating oils were just refined mineral oils of differing viscosity ranges with some additives included.

Current lubricating oils start as a straight mineral oil to which are added chemicals from several additive companies such as Adibas and others. Each additive company has its specialised properties and a given oil company can use additives from each supplier in different levels depending on the final properties desired and the price they want to sell the final product for. These additives provide

- Detergent capability
- Viscosity variability
- Anti-oxidant capability
- Soot suspension capability
- Ash control
- Anti-corrosion capability resistance to chemical attack of bronzes in cam follower pins.

As I said by keeping the soot in suspension this allows the oil filter to remove as much as possible by the filter. In summary do NOT use any flushing oil, it is fraught with danger. It is cheaper and simpler to just change the oil twice as often as the book says. This will reduce any tendency for the oil to degrade.


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THERE'S EXCITEMENT IN THE CASSAR HOUSEHOLD


