



"ROGER HOWES....STUDEBAKER CHAMP"

Roger, who was recently presented with his OBE (over bloody eighty) medallion by the Club, was number nine of 10 children. His family lived in Munster Avenue, Carnegie and he attended primary and secondary schools in nearby Glenhuntly.

After World War 11 came to a close, Roger and his family started holidaying at the Mount Martha Caravan Park, which at the time occupied the foreshore, before eventually spreading across the road to what is now known as the Balcombe Creek Estuary. (There is still a picture of Rogers sisters, taken in 1955, that you can observe on the Historical Board). Such was his family's fondness of the Caravan Park that they would arrive and set up on Christmas Eve, but wouldn't pack up until after Easter. Eventually they moved permanently to live in Mount Martha in 1959.

Roger's first job was "pumping petrol" at the Mount Martha Service Station until he started his apprenticeship at Turner Motors (Claude, Lawrie and Les) who were the Rootes Group Dealers in Mornington.

When Lysaghts came to Hastings in the early seventies Roger discovered that he could earn a lot more money over there with Pioneer Concrete, on the first stage of Lysaght's construction, than he could "turning nuts and bolts" and made the move. He remained with Pioneer when the construction of the effluent tunnel that runs under Arthurs Seat to Cape Shank began.

Following this Roger went into business with Jim Broomfield setting up a garage in Diane Street, Mornington. Jim had been the foreman at Turner Motors when Roger was doing his apprenticeship there.

After some years with Jim, Roger set up his own workshop and business carrying out Auto LPG conversions, which had become so popular with car owners that he was booked up for months ahead. Then, when LPG converted taxis started "blowing up" in Melbourne so did LPG's reputation and business went very quiet.

Roger decided to look for another way to make a living and this is when he started a 20 year career driving Touring Coaches.

For the first ten years he drove for Australia Pacific Tours, who ran their business from Mentone and a further ten years with another company ultimately clocking up more than two million kilometres all over Australia. (I'm hearing Lucky Starr here singing "I've Been Everywhere Man")

Roger's first car was a 1928 Chevrolet, followed by a 1936 Ford Roadster. Next came a 1946 Ford Deluxe and then, inexplicably a Ford Anglia 105E.

A later purchase was a Chrysler Valiant VF 770 which Roger describes as the best car that he has ever owned.

His first new car was a 1971 Ford Falcon that he states was the worst car he has ever owned.

He has also owned a Pontiac Parisienne and an Oldsmobile Cutlass Supreme that he sold to his dentist who noticed it in his surgery car park.

This was followed by a 1963 Studebaker that was finally driven to the tip.

Growing up in Mount Martha as a young boy in the 1950's and 60's Roger would spend weekends with his mates and got to know the Buxton family who owned the, well

known, Glynt property that at the time was a fully operating farm. That family owned the "Canada Cycle and Motor Company" who were the Studebaker Distributers for Australia.



Roger recalls that Mr and Mrs (later Dame) Buxton had matching model Studebakers that were always rolled out of the Glynt garage and washed and detailed every Sunday morning weather they had been driven or not.

After Len and Rita Buxton had both passed away these two cars were auctioned at Glynt in 1977. Although Roger hoped to buy both cars he was the successful bidder on Len's car only, which had a mere 33,000miles on the clock.

It's a 1964 Studebaker Cruiser four door sedan, auto with a 259cubic inch V8 engine, still in outstanding original

condition and a real credit to Rogers 45 years of ownership.

Roger is also in the process of carrying out a complete ground up restoration of a 1925 Studebaker Standard Six from Ceduna, South Australia. It had been locked in a shed for 30 years due to a broken water pump but Roger's attention to detail in this undertaking of huge proportions is incredible to say the least.



Roger's brother Kevin bought an Australian built Tiger Moth back in 1961 for two thousand pounds. It is one of around 1200 planes that De Havilland built in Sydney with engines made in Melbourne by a consortium led by General Motors. This plane has both RAF and RAAF serial numbers and it was last flown in 1994.

When Roger's brother died his plumbing business in Traralgon was sold but the Tiger Moth and Bedford truck were bought by Roger. He then hired two trucks and with the fuselage on one and the wings on the other he and his mates brought the little plane down to Roger's home where he started it's restoration.



So, with the 1925 Studebaker and the Tiger Moth both undergoing very detailed restorations Roger is a very busy and dedicated bloke. He is also a terrific Club man as well.



CRUDEN Farm was established by Keith Murdoch in 1928 when he presented his 19 year old wife Elizabeth with a small farm, which the Murdoch family developed into the wonderful facility we see today.

All of the entrance fees were donated to the BEYOND BLUE mental health charity which was established in 2000 by ex Premier Jeff Kennett.

As always, the AOMC was very well organised as we entered Cruden Farm and the S.P.H. & V. Club established ourselves near the Main access gate on the well manicured grass area, and was probably the biggest club display.

The club had a wonderful turn out of desirable vehicles, but the stars of the show were the FORD GT 40 and the MERCEDES BENZ 300SL GULLWING, which drew large crowds every time the doors or bonnets were opened..

The Alvis Story Bill Glover

When did you last see one of these high performance elegant cars on the road in Australia? I was prompted to look into my "Encylopaedia of Classic Cars" by the now familiar to Crankhandle readers, writer Rob de la Rive Box to see what Rob had to say about the old very and respected British company and at the same time shot off an email to the company in UK who still produce a limited run of very expensive Alvis cars and also read the very comprehensive publication of the Victorian branch of the Alvis Car Club to bring me up to date.

I received a copy of a video from the UK company holding the Alvis name regarding their current state of production, they are quick to claim that the company still produces automobiles, in fact they will build you virtually any year car to order, including some of their classic cars of past years as well as the latest model. They retain a number of the old classic cars, in various state of repair, some almost disappearing under rust and use them as a guide together with their very extensive holding of spare parts to build the customer a new car using all the old traditional skills as well as the very latest developments in production -Just say what you word!

The film depicts skilled workman using the traditional skills of body building, hand in hand with the latest mechanical techniques in engine and suspension set ups to bring you the car of your dreams. Imagine fronting up to Alvis, pointing a photo of your favourite model and saying "Build me this!" and they will!

The video does not disclose when the new owners took control of the company but they retain the right to build and sell Alvis Cars, which retain all the glamour of the original. By 1928 there were already 6000 Alvis cars on the road, and just prior to the war they set up a large new factory in Coventry in 1937 to produce a range of aircraft engines and military vehicles which during the war attracted sustained heavy bombing virtually destroying the plant. This set the company back financially but in the following peace years they resumed car production. The first new design appeared in 1950 and featured a very attractive convertible, equal to the best, most of which were designated for the USA. Alvis retained a Swiss design engineer to design these attractive cars but by 1965/67 it was all over and they were taken over by Rover and subsequently by the rapacious Leyland. In their final year the designer introduced the Alvis TF21, a quite stunning car mostly in coupe and convertible form featuring a 3 litre engine developing 150 BHP allowing for a top speed of 125 MPH. but alas, it was all too late.

The Alvis name have been kept alive by Alvis car clubs especially in countries like Australia where the breed has been maintained by mostly state based Alvis clubs, strongly assisted by The Alvis Car Club of Victoria who maintain and promote ownership of these great cars.

One has to admire the current owners of the company, who are preserving the name, performance and quality of these lovely cars and we wish them every success. The going rate for a new hand built Alvis is in excess of \$312.000 dollars, probably worth every penny.

Our Club is blessed with a strong Alvis connection, in 2020 the Octos wrote a piece on Bru Jones in Crankhandle and his wonderful 3 litre Lagonda and also his, ex-Chris Higgins, Alvis Doctors Coupe, both quite outstanding cars and in the early to mid-2000's we covered Chris' stable

More Alvis Tales


I had looked up the original 1954 list of Victorian Alvis Car Club members, then in its 2nd year of existence and found the name of committee member, one John Callaway, a well known and likable figure around Mount Eliza in the old days. John is no longer with us but Brenda Callaway is a good friend of the writer, so immediately contacted Brenda to see what she could remember about John's Alvis. Brenda was a fund of knowledge because they had just become engaged and the Alvis was their mode of transportation. Brenda then went through a lifetime of old photos and found a little black and white photo of John Callaway and his mate Chris Avery. John Callaway was also a Rolls Royce collector and the Rolls Club listed his cars on his death in a tribute to him, these included his RR 1923 Twenty horsepower (77A2) often seen in Mt Eliza streets. The list included a 1929 Phantom11 120, a 1936 and 1937 Bentley XJ 4¼ litre, a 1950 Silver Dawn and two 1951 Bentley Mark V1's

I told Mick of this latest development to see if he could add to the story. He remembers John 's Alvis very well and recalled one incident. One Sunday morning after a late night out John Callaway and friend Chris Avery, (also close friend to both our Mick and Michael Hurd,) decided to work on the car, (he also owned an Alvis 4 cylinder/60), in the street outside John's parents home in Mont Albert. Chis went into the garage for more tools and John continued to work underneath car on an exhaust rattle. Chris on returning to the car could not see John, assuming John had gone into the house so, on impulse, decided the car needed a road test so set off around the block. When he


returned he found John still lying on the road outside the house between where the rear wheels had been, sound asleep!



For Sale 1935 Austin Seven Ruby - Egan Body


We bought this Ruby as a project in the back corner of the garage waiting for a rainy day. That was COVID. This
